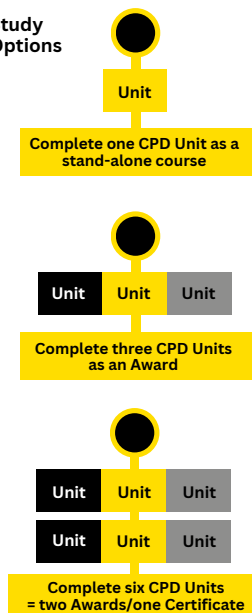

Developing Reading Skills in Learners with Dyslexia

Understand how learners acquire and develop reading skills and understand why difficulties in reading occur and what we can do about them. Level 5 Specialist Teaching Assistant Apprenticeship - Literacy specialism

Dyslexia Action Training has co-developed this apprenticeship programme, which will be delivered by our sister company, Educational and Sporting Futures (ESF), an Ofsted outstanding apprenticeship provider.

This brand new programme, enables Teaching, Learning Support and Classroom Assistants, with 1 year of experience, to build on previous knowledge and/or qualifications. Participants will learn how to plan, prepare, deliver and evaluate learning and assessment activities and interventions to support individual, small group and whole class literacy learning.

In addition to developing core competencies such as overcoming barriers to learning, planning and assessment, communication, and professionalism, participants will develop the specialist knowledge, skills and behaviours to provide specialist literacy support to learners.

Embark on this apprenticeship to unlock a wealth of benefits for your career and personal growth. Through this comprehensive programme, you will gain:

- Specialist literacy training with support from experienced professionals and coaches
- A deep understanding of policies, practices, and procedures relevant to your role

Fund this programme through the Apprenticeship Levy

If your employer (school, nursery, MAT, or local authority) is an apprenticeship-levy paying employer (i.e. they have a wage bill in excess of £3m) then 100% of the apprenticeship is paid for from the employer's levy pot.

If your employer does not pay the Apprenticeship Levy then the Government will fund 95% of the apprenticeship and your employer will need to commit to paying 5% of the fee. ESF should be able to support your school or nursery to reclaim this cost via a process known as Levy Transfer.

Become a Specialist Teacher / Practitioner at level 5 or level 7

Unlike some other providers, we offer Specialist Teacher / Practitioner qualifications at both Level 5 and Level 7. You do not have to complete the level 5 course before moving to level 7 teaching certificate if you meet the entry requirements for level 7 in the first instance.

Our Level 7 programme carries Masters credits, so if you wish to complete a full MEd in the future, you should opt for level 7 rather than the level 5. Upon completion of either programme, if you hold QTS, or a PGCE, you may refer to yourself as a specialist teacher, if not you would refer to yourself as a specialist practitioner.

Level 5 Diploma in Specialist Teaching for Literacy-Related Difficulties (DIST) graduate route

The Level 5 Diploma is delivered online, undertaken part-time and is suitable for classroom teachers, teaching assistants and support tutors wishing to become specialist SpLD teachers (with QTS/PGCE) or practitioners (those without QTS/ PGCE) across all age ranges.

Upon completion, memberships are offered from The Dyslexia Guild and also from the British Dyslexia Association and PATOSS.

The Level 5 Diploma graduate route requires 13 hours (notional) study a week and takes approximately one year to complete. If you do not hold a degree you may be able to follow our CPD Pathway route (see page 15).

Please note: The Level 5 Diploma does not award university masters credits.

Level 7 Postgraduate Certificate: Specialist Teaching for Literacy-Related Difficulties

The Postgraduate Level 7 Certificate and Diploma courses in Literacy-Related Difficulties are prestigious programmes at Master's level 7 that provide training to become informed specialist teachers/practitioners and/or assessors. The courses are modular and are undertaken part-time, through online learning.

This programme has been developed by Dyslexia Action Training and is awarded and quality assured by Middlesex University. You will receive a Middlesex award upon successful completion. Additional accreditations and memberships are also offered from The Dyslexia Guild, the British Dyslexia Association, PATOSS and SASC (PG Diploma only). The Level 7 programme requires 15-20 hours of (notional) study a week and you gain masters-level credits.

Option 1:

The Level 7 Postgraduate Diploma Specialist Assessment and Teaching for Literacy-Related Difficulties.

This Diploma will train you in specialist teaching (including the Dyslexia Action Literacy Programme) in year one and specialist assessment in year two.

The Diploma awards 120 masters credits and is the fastest route to become an assessor.

Upon completion you will be an assessor who is eligible to apply for an APC.

Option 2:

If you already hold an eligible **SpLD Level 5 Diploma** or **Level 7 Postgraduate Certificate in Specialist Teaching** (or equivalent) you can build on this qualification to become an assessor.

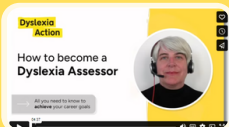
In addition to the above, on this route you will complete Real Training's Certificate of Competence in Educational Testing (CCET) and hold current BPS membership before moving onto Real Training's Dyslexia Professional Report Writing (D-PRW) module. Upon completion you will be an assessor who is eligible to apply for an APC.

Option 3:

If you already hold **Real Training's Certificate of Competence in Educational Testing (CCET)** or the **Certificate in Psychometric Testing, Assessment and Access Arrangements (CPT3A)** and current BPS membership, you can build on this to become an assessor.

On this route, your next step will be completing an eligible L5/7 SpLD Specialist Teacher qualification, before moving onto Real Training's Dyslexia Professional Report Writing module. Upon completion you will be an assessor who is eligible to apply for an APC.

Specialist Maths Teacher/Practitioner Training Level 7

This new Level 7 Certificate can be studied as a stand-alone Postgraduate Certificate (60 Masters credits) or combined with modules offered by our sister company Real Training to achieve a Postgraduate Diploma or Master of Education on the SEND and Inclusion or the Inclusive Educational Leadership programmes.

Mathematical Understanding and Teaching Methods - Underpinning Theory - 30 masters level credits

Assessment Practising Certificate (APC)



What is an Assessment Practising Certificate?

An APC is effectively a licence to practise. It confirms that you have the appropriate qualifications to undertake full diagnostic assessments and that your professional practice is up-to-date and has been externally verified as continuing to meet defined competence standards.

The APC Certificate is issued for three years and confirms that you have the knowledge, skills and competences to assess the detailed requirements of individuals with dyslexia/SpLD.

Only APC holders can undertake diagnostic assessment reports for Disabled Students' Allowance (DSA) applications.

The Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) also recognises that for the purposes of Examination Access Arrangements a specialist assessor is "... a specialist teacher with a current SpLD Assessment Practising Certificate."

Changes to legislation in 2019 mean that any diagnostic report written at any time by an APC holder can be used to apply for DSA. This means that reports now have a longer lifespan and those commissioning a report may expect to use this report over a longer period and for several purposes. Details can be found on the SASC website.

An Assessment Practising Certificate (APC) is a recognised standard for specialist literacy teacher/assessors.

The Department for Education (DfE) requires that specialist teachers or support tutors who undertake specialist assessments in post-16 schools, colleges, universities, workplace training establishments and local authority assessment centres are competent and qualified to do so.

The Dyslexia Guild is an awarding body issuing Assessment Practising Certificates on behalf of the SpLD Assessment Standards Committee (SASC).

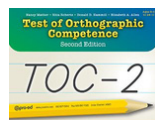

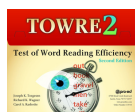
